Research Cited: Socratic seminars are named for their embodiment of Socrates' belief in the power of asking questions, prize inquiry over information and discussion over debate. Socratic seminars acknowledge the highly social nature of learning and align with the work of John Dewey, Lev Vygotsky, Jean Piaget, and Paulo Friere. Elfie Israel succinctly defines Socratic seminars and implies their rich benefits for students:

The Socratic seminar is a formal discussion, based on a text, in which the leader asks open-ended questions. Within the context of the discussion, students listen closely to the comments of others, thinking critically for themselves, and articulate their own thoughts and their responses to the thoughts of others. They learn to work cooperatively and to question intelligently and civilly. (89)

Purpose:	The purpose of this plan is to provide supplemental instruction to at-risk students to ensure mastery of course objectives and/or specific graduation requirements.
Delivery:	Remediation services will be provided weekly with after-school tutoring and with Saturday sessions held prior to semester testing. Saturday sessions are intensive review sessions for students in EOC classes.
Students Served:	Remediation is provided to all students who take EOC classes . All students are encouraged to attend. Though some students are more at-risk than others, all receive intense academic support to ensure the highest growth possible on state assessments.
